Tizian Büchi's L'Îlot wins Visions du Réel's Grand Prix 2022

With L'Îlot by Lausanne director Tizian Büchi, the jury of the International Feature Film Competition has awarded a first feature that oscillates between magical realism and the portrait of a community. A Long Journey Home, Chinese filmmaker Wengian Zhang's first feature, was awarded the Jury Prize of the Burning Lights competition. The Swiss-Japanese filmmaker Julie Sando wins the Jury Prize in the National Competition as well as the Zonta Prize for her school film Fuku Nashi. The Audience Award goes to Fire of Love by Sara Dosa. According to an early estimate, the Festival will close with approximately the same audience it attracted for its last physical edition held in Nyon in 2019, and will further expand its reach through its online offer. The Festival runs on site until Easter Sunday, 17 April, and online until Easter Monday, 18 April.



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"We made the bet to reinvent the festival, and we won – thanks to a very strong return to face-to-face events and an increased virtual dimension acquired during the pandemic," said Festival president Raymond Loretan, for whom the Visions du Réel team "has transformed a crisis into an opportunity in an exemplary manner". He added: "This 53rd edition is already historic, as it demonstrates that Visions du Réel is both a festival of direct encounters and a strong digital platform at the service of a diversified and globalized film culture. I would like to thank all our partners, both institutional and private, all the filmmakers and our dear public for having placed their trust in us. My gratitude goes above all to the Visions du Réel team under the leadership of its two directors, who have shown admirable tenacity and agility.

A diversified artistic record

With Tizian Büchi's L'Îlot, it is the first time since 2013 that a Swiss film has won the Grand Prix of Visions du Réel. Set in Lausanne, this first feature film seduced the jury with its "brilliant observation that rewrites the coordinates of geographical spaces in universal terms". Emilie Bujès, artistic director of Visions du Réel, is pleased with the artistic results: "This year's list of winners includes seven first features. New voices rub shoulders with the films of established filmmakers and engage in a dialogue with the works of our guests Marco Bellocchio, Kirsten Johnson and Hassen Ferhani. We are particularly pleased that the diversity of film genres, generations, approaches and geographies that guide us have been rewarded and welcomed by the public and the juries."

Admission numbers are comparable to 2019

The Festival runs in cinemas until Sunday evening and online until Monday. According to a first estimate, the attendance is comparable to that of 2019, i.e. around 45,000 admissions. These are divided between the general public, the 2,100 accredited professionals, the 2,600 children and teenagers at the school screenings and the participants of the cultural mediation activities, in particular the new offers for blind and visually impaired people.

An enhanced national and international impact through the online platform

Thanks to the livestreams of the public master classes and online talks that are accessible worldwide, the digital film market catalogue that is also accessible worldwide for professionals, and the online subscription that is open to the whole of Switzerland and offers some sixty films from the current programme, Visions du Réel has been able to continue to extend its national and international reach. Subscriptions for the online offer at the price of CHF 25 are still valid until Monday 18 April. The final data will be communicated as soon as all the festival's digital platforms, specific to professionals and the public, will have closed their doors.

The 54th edition of Visions du Réel will take place from 21 to 30 April 2023.


