## Swiss filmmaker Nicole Vögele wins the 2024 Grand Prix

The awards ceremony on Friday 19 April marked the end of the competitions of the 55th edition of Visions du Réel, and unveiled the much-awaited list of 2024 prize winners. Nicole Vögele took the Grand Prix for the International Feature Film Competition awarded by La Mobilière, for her film The Landscape and The Fury. The Burning Lights Competition recognised A Fidai Film by Kamal Aljafari, with its prize awarded by the Canton of Vaud. The film Brunaupark by Felix Hergert and Dominik Zietlow took the prize for the National Competition, awarded by SRG SSR. Finally, the Audience Award, given by the town of Nyon, went to Basel Adra, Yuval Abraham, Hamdan Ballal and Rachel Szor, with their film No Other Land. The Festival continues in person until Sunday and online until the evening of 28 April.

As remarked by Emilie Bujès, Artistic Director of Visions du Réel, "It's a pleasure to see the work of a bold - and Swiss - filmmaker rewarded for a major film. Her student film was previously screened at the Festival in 2013. The rest of the list of prize winners - both adventurous and joyful - is extremely open from a geographical perspective, including films from Africa, South America, Asia and the Middle East. It therefore embraces numerous forms and approaches,

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strongly embodying the diversity of the 2024 programming, which has reached many different audiences over the last ten days."

Nicole Vögele has won the International Feature Film Competition at the 55th edition of Visions du Réel. The jury, comprising producer Dora Bouchoucha, artistic director Carlo Chatrian and filmmaker Carmen Jaquier, mentions having been "impressed by the approach of a film which renders, little by little, the complexity of reality and allows the viewer to question their place in the world."

Rising Up at Night by Nelson Makengo took the special jury prize awarded by the Nyon region "for a film which rises to the challenge of filming darkness, without ever losing sight of the daily resistance and resourcefulness of a population facing a truly difficult situation," while My Memory Is Full of Ghosts by Anas Zawahri and We Are Inside by Farah Kassem both received a special mention.

The prize for the Burning Lights Competition, another of the Festival's major international competitions and awarded by the Canton of Vaud, this year went to A Fidai Film from filmmaker Kamal Aljafari. The jury highlighted the power of a film which "shows us what our vocation, as workers of cinema, can be in a moment of such wanton destruction: to witness, to preserve, and most of all, to remember. The film shows us that wars are fought not just with bombs and bullets, but also with memory." Within the same competition, the special jury prize awarded by Société des Hôteliers from La Côte went to Riders by Martín Rejtman. The jury described it as a film which "takes the people who toil thanklessly and invisibly to make the rest of our lives comfortable, as its focus. It makes these workers visible, not through patronising ethnography or exposition, but through the power of the moving image."

Finally, the prize for the National Competition was awarded by SRG SSR to Brunaupark by Felix Hegert and Dominik Zietlow, for a film described by the jury as, "A declaration of love for a block of flats threatened with demolition. This ensemble film portrays a diverse community, which is resisting gentrification and the property speculation seen in large cities today." To complete the national list of prize winners, the special jury prize awarded by SSA/Suissimage went to Valentina and the MUOSters by Francesca Scalisi: "The film takes us on a cinematic journey where beauty and bareness coexist. Within a contemporary socio-political context, we witness a warm yet powerful tale of emancipation, embedded in a cherished landscape that is threatened by humans and nature alike." Meanwhile, An Ordinary Life by Alexander Kuznetsov and Sauve qui peut by Alexe Poukine each received a special mention.

We should also note that each of the prize-winning films this year had their world-premiere screening, except for Rising Up at Night which had its international premiere and the Audience Award.
